General Rules and Regulations

The following rules and regulations apply to all sections of the Fair. Additional rules applicable to specific sections may be found in those sections.

Making Entries:

All entry forms must be in the hands of the Fair Secretary by 9 pm on Monday, August 31, 2009 unless otherwise noted. An additional late entry charge of \$1.00 per item will be charged after that date. Late fees for livestock are noted in the livestock section.

Entry Tags Returned:

Exhibitors wishing to have entry tags returned to them should enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope with their entry form.

Exhibitors to be Members of the Society

All exhibitors must pay \$6.00 to the Spencerville Agricultural Society for the year 2009. Membership for next year will be retained from an exhibitor's winnings.

Exhibitors to assume all Risks and Liability

The Spencerville Agricultural Society will take every precaution to prevent accidents, but the Society and its Directors will not hold themselves responsible for any accident on the fair grounds. All exhibits, displays and events are at the risk of the exhibitor. The Society and its Directors will not be responsible for any loss, damage, illness, disease or accident occurring to any person, animal or property on the grounds during the fair.

Livestock Exhibitors to own Liability Insurance

Exhibitors of livestock must have their own liability insurance of \$1,000,000.00 (one million dollars). Copy to be sent with entry forms in order to exhibit.

Produce, Article or Animal Ownership and Age

All produce must be raised by the exhibitor and be this year's production. All articles and animals must be the bona fide property of the member in whose name they are entered. The ownership of animals or articles as well as the ages of all animals must be sworn, if required by any Director.

Entry Limits on Exhibitors and Animals

No exhibitor will be allowed to compete in any one section for more than one prize, except livestock. No animal will be allowed to compete for more than one prize in any class except for a special prize. Animals must not compete in any class except that set apart for them.

Arrival and Departure of Exhibits

All exhibits must be brought in between 6 pm to 9 pm on Wednesday night or Thursday morning 8 am to 10 am. Judging commences Thursday September 10th at 10:30 sharp. Buildings are open to the public Thursday at 6 pm and close at 9 pm. Friday and Saturday buildings are open 9 am to 9 pm. Sunday buildings open from 9 am till 4 pm. No exhibits shall be removed from the grounds until Sunday between 4 pm and 5:30 pm. Unclaimed exhibits will become property of the Fair Board after 6 pm.

Livestock Exhibitor Passes

Exhibitor passes will be provided as follows:

- **Horses** – see horse section.
- **Cattle** – one pass for one to four animals; one pass for each additional four animals.
- **Sheep and Goats** – one pass for one to eight animals; one pass for each additional eight animals.
- **Poultry and Small Animals** – one pass for fifteen or more entries.

Entries must be submitted in time to have passes returned to the exhibitor. You must have the pass with you or you will have to pay.

Arrival and Securing of Animals

Horses must be on the grounds by 9 am unless otherwise stated. All animals must be secured from running at large on the fair grounds. Animals must enter via Goodin Road livestock gate. Parking is available

Obtaining Prizes and Trophies

Trophies and special prizes should be picked up on Saturday at your display area. Prize money will be mailed by the middle of November. All cheques issued by the Spencerville Agricultural Society must be presented at a bank on or before December 27, 2009 or the prize money will be forfeited.

NOTE ALL MAJOR CHANGES WILL BE IN BOLD PRINT

Any information collected by the Spencerville Agricultural Society regarding member, exhibitors, commercial exhibitors, sponsors, directors and any other persons related directly to the business of the Spencerville Agricultural Society and the Spencerville Fair, will be solely used for the purpose of promotion of Spencerville Agricultural Society and the Spencerville Fair, and for the maintenance of their files and data base. Any member, exhibitor, commercial exhibitor, sponsor or director realizes that when they agree to take part in the Spencerville Agricultural Society and the Spencerville Fair, that their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

2. Entries to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 192 inches or 480 cm. Note the article can be square, rectangular etc.
3. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt/Wall Hanging will be selected at the annual O.A.A.S. Convention.
4. Upon making entry into the O.A.A.S. Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
5. The winning O.A.A.S. Champion Machine Quilted Quilt/Wall Hanging will not be eligible to compete in future District and/or O.A.A.S. Provincial competition.
6. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on a sign provided by O.A.A.S.
7. The Quilt/Wall Hanging must not be quilted using a long arm machine and must be machine-quilted by the exhibitor.
8. Quilt/Wall Hanging must have visible machine quilting.
9. Each local fair is entitled to send only one Grand Champion Machine Quilted Article judged best of show of all eligible machine quilted articles to the district competition or if any entry wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible Machine Quilted Articles at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this item was entered and won, should enter their Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of eligible Machine Quilted Articles in the District Competition.
10. If an exhibitor wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible Machine Quilting classes at other than his/her own Fair, or at more than one Fair, the exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as one from which the item will be sent to the District Competition.
11. An exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different machine quilted article at different fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning article to compete at the District competition.

12. Local Home Craft Divisions are requested to judge a Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible Machine Quilted articles as well as a Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of eligible Machine Quilted articles.
13. The Grand Champion and the Reserve Grand Champion are judged from all first and second prize eligible articles.
